A MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT AND CEO DR. ROBIN GANZERT

They say that hindsight is always 20/20. But sometimes, so is foresight.

When American Humane was founded in 1877 as the country's first national humane organization, our vision was to build a better and kinder world for all. During the next 143 years, American Humane led the way in pioneering virtually every one of the humane protections we now take for granted. We created the first independently verifiable standards and programs to safeguard animals wherever and whenever they are in need. Still, there is much more to do.

Ten years ago, with a new administration, we undertook a **Humane 2020 Visioning Project**. More than 300 internal and external stakeholders participated in a deep-dive conversation about the future goals of American Humane and where we hoped to be in the year 2020. We developed a transformative agenda, focusing on pushing the frontiers of the humane movement and further extending our historic leadership where we could have the greatest impact.

I am pleased to report that as a result of this vision and agenda, American Humane's reach has skyrocketed by **2,000 percent** in just the past decade so that we now directly touch the lives of some **one billion animals each year** through our programs – more than any other humane group. We not only help twenty times as many animals as we did ten years ago but we developed new protections for millions more around the globe.

In the past year alone, American Humane was able to:

- Rescue, shelter, feed and care for 500,325 animals in disasters, including the COVID-19 pandemic, Hurricane Dorian in the Bahamas, the Oklahoma floods and the Australian wildfires.

- Protect nearly 100,000 animal actors during 3,555 production days on film and television sets through our No Animals Were Harmed® program.
- Help ensure the welfare and humane treatment of nearly 400,000 remarkable and endangered species living in the world's zoos, aquariums and conservation centers.
- Save the lives of veterans and animals by finding dogs in need of forever homes and training them as life-saving service dogs for veterans struggling to cope with Post-Traumatic Stress and Traumatic Brain Injury.
- Help ensure that nearly a billion farm animals have enough space, proper food, water, heating, cooling, lighting and other humane protections.

American Humane also has a long history of doing the most with the hard-earned charitable dollars with which we are entrusted. More than 91 cents of every dollar spent goes directly into our life-changing, life-saving programs to help the most vulnerable among us.

I think you will enjoy the heartwarming stories of caring, compassion and hope in our Impact Report. Thank you for making our 2020 vision of a better world come into ever sharper focus so we can fulfill the promise of helping even more animals in the years ahead.



AMERICAN HUMANE RESCUE

First to Serve® animals in greatest need

For more than 100 years, American Humane Rescue teams have been First to Serve our best friends in their worst times. Last year proved to be one of the most devastating years for disasters and cruelty cases in recent history, tearing families apart and leaving hundreds of thousands of animals homeless, hurt, frightened and hungry. Fortunately, our American Humane Rescue teams were on the ground wherever – and whenever – animals were in greatest need.

Here are just some of the dramatic and heartwarming victories we achieved:

- **The deadly COVID-19 pandemic:** American Humane took a leadership role in supporting shelter pets abandoned during the pandemic, providing critically needed food, supplies and medicines through our “Feed the Hungry” fund, and launching a nationwide campaign to stop people from giving up their companions and to foster or adopt shelter animals. Our efforts were carried by NBC’s TODAY news site, People magazine, U.S. News & World Report and national radio networks, reaching millions.
- **Hurricane Dorian:** When this devastating storm struck the Bahamas, American Humane evacuated animals, helped search for and rescue hundreds more, distributed nearly 50,000 meals, paid for veterinary care on the island, and helped rebuild a critically important shelter to ensure safe housing for lost pets.
- **Flood of Aid:** Following historic flooding in Oklahoma, our rescue team rushed in, saving bewildered, terrified animals like Roscoe, an aging, mixed-breed dog whose home disappeared under 12 feet of water and was found clinging to life in the branches of a tree.
- **Australian wildfires:** American Humane worked with our humane conservation partners to support lifesaving efforts to get veterinary care, food, water, medicines and supplies to the animal victims in the scorched wastelands of Australia.
- **Reaching millions with lifesaving information:** Actress and producer Vivica A. Fox taped a national Public Service Announcement, urging people to become American Humane Rescue volunteers and adopt from shelters. Look and listen for this message on your local TV and radio stations soon!
- **Delivering a ton of love to 400+ starving cats:** American Humane and Chicken Soup for the Soul Pet Food delivered thousands of pounds of food to hundreds of hungry cats at an abandoned property as plans were made to rescue and rehome them.
- **Bringing help to those who need it most:** American Humane conducted free veterinary clinics to help animals in some of the most resource-poor areas of the country, bringing spay and neuter services and lifesaving vaccines provided free of charge by Zoetis Petcare to dogs and cats whose families cannot afford to give them medical care.
- **Training more rescuers:** Our American Humane Rescue team, which has been first to serve in rescuing animals for more than 100 years, trained 880 animal emergency responders in 17 states and the nation’s capital – so that they can be ready to help animals in need... anytime, anywhere.
- **Feeding shelter animals:** American Humane and Chicken Soup for the Soul Pet Food delivered more than 10 tons of hope and nutritious, free meals to hungry, frightened and abandoned animals in shelters in just the last year.



KEEPING HOPE ALIVE: DISASTER IN THE BAHAMAS

Surrounded by the shattered remains of her home, an elderly dog lay barely moving on an old mattress. After being rushed to a shelter where she received lifesaving nourishment, fluids and tender loving care, the starving, frightened and dehydrated pet we named “Hope” slowly rose and took her first steps toward Amber, a first responder with our American Humane Rescue team. Laying her head in Amber’s hands, she looked up and, in our rescue worker’s words, “She looked at me with complete trust, and for the first time knew that she was safe.”

In September, the most powerful hurricane ever to strike the Bahamas swept through the island chain with winds of 185 mph, splintering homes, buildings, boats, trees and lives. On Great Abaco Island, Hurricane Dorian destroyed or swept almost everything in its path out to sea. All told, the storm caused \$7 billion in damage and left more than 70,000 people and tens of thousands of animals homeless.

In the wake of the disaster, American Humane, the country’s first national humane organization, immediately deployed its rescue team with an invitation from the International Fund for Animal Welfare, conducting search-and-rescue operations, setting up, rebuilding and running shelters, transporting tons of emergency food, performing spay-and-neuters, funding veterinary care, and helping airlift animals to New Providence Island to help reunite pets with their families. During our multiple deployments to the Bahamas, American Humane found and provided critical aid to hundreds of emaciated, dehydrated, injured and starving dogs, cats, ducks, chickens, goats, turtles, pigs and sheep.

“This is by far one of the most intense and traumatic disasters we have ever been involved with,” said American Humane President and CEO Robin Ganzert, PhD. “With increasingly frequent and increasingly destructive natural disasters, so many animals are in crisis. We are grateful to all the generous supporters who made it possible for our rescue team to help our best friends in their worst times.”



SHELTER ANIMALS CARRIED TO SAFETY

Here at home, American Humane was busy at work even before Hurricane Dorian struck, evacuating scores of shelter animals in its path. American Humane volunteers rushed to pick up vulnerable pets at a South Carolina shelter and drove them more than 700 miles to safe havens in New York and New Jersey where they would find safety and forever homes. Scores of beautiful cats and kittens were evacuated – a rescue made possible by generous donations from animal lovers across the country, including a remarkable grant from the Marta Heflin Foundation. To all of them, and our brave volunteers who drove through the night to take a shelter full of abandoned animals out of harm’s way and to new lives, thank you.



A FLOOD OF SUPPORT FOR OKLAHOMA'S ANIMALS

And the rains came.

And kept coming. Soon, roads, homes, businesses, parks and farms began disappearing under the relentless onslaught of the historic rains that soaked and then flooded Oklahoma. Responding to an official call for assistance, the American Humane Rescue team rushed to the scene with its chief rescue veterinarian, trained swift- and floodwater responders, rescue boats, critical medical and sheltering supplies generously donated by Zoetis, and one of our 50-foot animal rescue vehicles.

Our team began search-and-rescue and flood/slack water operations, navigating murky waters in the Muskogee area. Along with local animal groups, they began saving cats, dogs and even a wild rabbit. One dramatic rescue involved Roscoe, a dog who lived in the community of hard-hit Webbers Falls. His family had to evacuate as the floodwaters approached. Unable to take him with them during the emergency, they reached out for help to go in and rescue him. American Humane, Code 3 Associates and firefighters with the Webbers Falls Fire Department launched boats on a rescue mission into the swirling soup of contaminated floodwaters. The location where Roscoe had been left in a fenced yard



was now under 10 to 12 feet of water. More than two days had passed since the flooding began and we were not sure if he would have been able to survive the ordeal. As we approached the known location, we spotted Roscoe's white head and front paws, clinging for life in the branches of a tree.

"As we approached, the fear and exhaustion that he showed was heartbreaking," said American Humane Rescue Veterinarian Lesa Staubus, DVM. "Pulling his large body from the muddy water wasn't easy as he was tangled in the branches. With careful teamwork we were able to safely get Roscoe into our boat and into a transport kennel. As he was transported out of the flood area he promptly collapsed into a deep

sleep. His poor body was exhausted. We are happy to report that the following morning, after he had had food and rest, he seemed much more settled, although no doubt still traumatized."

As his family struggled to reclaim some sense of normal life and be reunited with Roscoe, we worked with our sheltering partners to care for him.

"Storms like these can be deadly for pets who are separated from their families," said Dr. Robin Ganzert, president and CEO of American Humane. "We are glad that we were once again able to help our animal friends in this disaster."

Since 1916, American Humane has been First to Serve those who serve our country by helping our nation's military heroes on the battlefield and on the home front.

- **Bringing battle buddies back together:** After a lifetime of serving our country and protecting our troops, far too many retired military dogs are separated from their handlers and left overseas. American Humane has already brought 42 of these heroes home and reunited them with their battle buddies.
- **Saving lives on each end of the leash:** To help stem the tide of veteran suicide and save unadopted animals, American Humane launched the "Pups4Patriots™" program, which finds dogs in need of forever homes and trains them to become lifesaving service dogs for veterans coping with PTS and TBI.
- **Reaching out to those in need:** A new national PSA campaign starring Broadway and film star Kristin Chenoweth encourages veterans to apply for a free, lifesaving service dog trained by the experts at American Humane. These TV and radio spots have aired more than a thousand times so far, reaching millions.
- **Urging Congress to do more for veterans:** Service dogs are not only costly but can take an unacceptable 18-24 months to obtain. The "PAWS for Veterans Therapy Act" will train and pair vets suffering from post-deployment mental health issues with service dogs.
- **Honoring America's four-legged military heroes:** Four courageous canines were awarded American Humane's Lois Pope LIFE K-9 Medal of Courage, the nation's highest award for military dogs. The internationally covered ceremony on Capitol Hill included hundreds of congressional staff and top U.S. military leaders, including U.S. Marine Corps Brigadier General Robert C. Fulford and U.S. Marine Corps Colonel Scott Campbell (Ret.).





A LIFESAVING PAIRING: THE STORY OF A VETERAN AND HIS DOG

Retired United States Army Sergeant Joseph served our country and found himself, like so many other brave warriors, in need of a helping hand. American Humane answered the call, and through our Pups4Patriots program, trained Nattie, a two-year-old female Shepherd mix as his highly specialized service dog. Sergeant Joseph said that before he met Nattie, his days and nights were filled with darkness, depression and anxiety. He felt as if he had no purpose and, as is very common, he avoided crowds and even going out, doing his grocery shopping at 2 or 3 in the morning on a weekend just so he could avoid people. Then he met Nattie. From day one, he says, they became best friends. Soon, he was able to go to public places without his anxiety becoming unmanageable. When Sgt. Joseph doesn't feel good and shows that he needs assistance, Nattie picks up on it and will climb up in his lap or stand up and put her feet on his stomach....basically, just to let him know she's there for him. Of course, with her specialized training, she does so much more to help support her veteran and keep him on the path to healing. Joseph is sleeping better. Work has been more enjoyable. He now gets out and goes for walks around the neighborhood. As he puts it, "Nattie has basically saved my life. I still have some bad days, but thanks to American Humane, and Nattie, they're not as bad. I feel as if I have a new purpose in life."

Thank you for your service, Sgt. Joseph! Our Pups4Patriots program has been especially important during the COVID-19 pandemic, when isolation and stress conspire to create the perfect storm for veterans with PTSD. We are so honored to have been able to pair so many veterans before the crisis, helping them in these difficult times.

REUNITING OUR FOUR-LEGGED MILITARY HEROES AND THEIR FORMER HANDLERS

Too often, the military working dog teams who served and bonded together overseas find themselves separated by circumstance, reassignment or thousands of miles. American Humane, which has been bringing dozens of retired military working dogs home and back into the arms of their battle buddies, was honored to bring two more of these lifesaving teams back together so that they may once again be with the comrades with whom they were so close.

Two of these comrades are U.S. Army Staff Sergeant Charles Ogin IV and Explosives Detection Dog Rrobiek. Sgt. Ogin and Robi served three years together on the hot sands of Iraq and Syria, but hadn't seen each other since December 2017. Learning that the nine-year-old Belgian Malinois was retiring from service, American Humane, with the support of Hallmark Channel, sent one of its top veterinarians to pick up and escort Rrobiek to Florida, where Sgt. Ogin adopted Robi into his family. Robi will no longer work. He can spend his days playing with the Ogin children and the family's two Jack Russell terriers – an awesome pack in the making. Robi will now have the loving forever home he so richly deserved. It's the type of happy retirement that other military working dogs also merit.

"When I had to say goodbye to him, I thought I was going to be okay just saying goodbye and leaving him to another handler, but I broke down the second I hugged him around his neck," said Staff Sgt Ogin. "After four years you grow together and essentially become family, so I am looking forward to having him home and spoiling him as much as I can."

We at American Humane want to make sure that these hard-working dogs on the front lines of freedom come home and receive the pampering and love they deserve. Hero war dog Robi, thank you for your service!



HONORING AMERICA'S FOUR-LEGGED MILITARY HEROES

The four courageous canines who were awarded American Humane's Lois Pope LIFE K-9 Medal of Courage during a Capitol Hill ceremony were Military Working Dog Troll, who took part in 89 combat missions, during one of which Troll located three IEDs, saving 65 Coalition Forces members, and clearing a landing zone to Medevac out wounded troops; "Sergeant Yeager," who served in Iraq and Afghanistan and was awarded the Purple Heart after shrapnel wounds from an IED caused him to lose part of his ear; Military Working Dog K-9 Niko, who conducted more than 600 missions in Afghanistan for the U.S. State Department in support of the U.S. Department of Defense, the Central Intelligence Agency, the United States Agency for International Development, and other alliance countries that are a part of NATO; and Military Working Dog Emmie who served with the U.S. Marine Corps during Operation Enduring Freedom and was then certified as a Police Explosive Detection Dog for the Pentagon.

Thank you to all these courageous canines for their service to our country.

ALICE: A BOY'S BEST FRIEND

In 2015, Antonio was a normal, playful nine-year-old who loved soccer and his friends. Then, on a normal day, while riding in the back of his parents' SUV with his younger brothers on the way to a family dinner, a man fired three to five bullets into their car and shot him in the head. Since that day Antonio has been fighting the battle of a lifetime. He spent 18 days in a coma and has endured five brain surgeries. Nearly four years later, an artificial skull covers half of Antonio's brain, because a seizure causing a fall could be fatal. Antonio not only battles seizures, but migraines, balance issues, spells and more. In October of 2016, Antonio was paired with his service dog, Alice, a five-year-old German Shepherd from Guardian Angels Medical Service Dogs in Florida. His mom, Tara, says, "Alice is a hero in our eyes, because without her, Antonio would not be able to do the



simple things in life that we take for granted." Going to school, the store, or even just a walk outside would be impossible for him. Never once has Alice failed to alert to an oncoming seizure or "spell" and she assists him with his balance issues. Alice has given Antonio the chance at a new normal life he couldn't have had without her. She is a loyal and loving hero every day. She's saved Antonio's life many times. She is his guardian

angel and helps him live his new normal to the fullest extent possible. For her extraordinary bravery and good works, Alice won both the American Humane Hero Dog Awards' Hero Service Dog category and the top "American Hero Dog" title. We thank her for all she does for Antonio, and category sponsor Lulu's Fund for helping draw attention to Alice's story, spotlighting the life-changing, life-saving abilities of our best friends.

around the world. All of our certification programs are built upon objective, evidence-based standards created by the world's leading veterinarians, animal experts and animal ethicists.

To ensure compliance with these standards and absolute integrity of reporting, these standards are enforced by independent, expert third-party auditors or Certified Safety Animal Representatives with ultimate oversight of all programs provided by the country's trusted first national humane organization. The expertise and verification process helps provide those who care about animals with assurance that the creatures under the certification enjoy demonstrably good welfare and were treated humanely.

American Humane was the first national humane organization to serve in the protection of farm animals. In fact, we were founded on this vital issue in 1877 and for 143 years have led the way in promoting the welfare and humane treatment of animals in agriculture.

Today, we help ensure better lives for nearly 1 billion farm animals through our American Humane Certified™ program, the first, largest and most trusted independent farm welfare and audit effort in the country. Just some of our key victories during the past year include:

- **Promoting the welfare and humane treatment of nearly 1 billion farm animals** under more than 200 rigorous, science-based standards covering everything from adequate space to air and water quality, heating, lighting, shade and animals' ability to engage in natural behaviors.
- **Adding more humane producers** under the American Humane Certified seal, including labels such as Organic Pasture Farms; Ohio Natural Eggs; Almark Foods; Idalou Egg Ranch; LesserEvil; MCM Poultry; Mid-States Specialty Eggs; Shepherd's Processed Eggs; and Sparkling Meadow Farms. Significant additions like these help to increase the reach of our protective umbrella covering hundreds of millions of chickens, turkeys, dairy cows and other agricultural species who deserve good welfare and humane treatment.

- **Encouraging Congress and the American people to support humanely raised foods** was the goal of our Capitol Hill briefing, outlining advances in agricultural practices and calling on everyone to rally behind humane farming practices that feed the world and treat animals right.



In the face of what scientists are calling a “Sixth Mass Extinction” with species disappearing at an unprecedented rate, zoos and aquariums are playing an outsized role in preserving the vital web of life on Earth. To elevate standards and shine a spotlight on those who take good care of their animals, American Humane developed the first-ever independent, science-based humane certification dedicated solely to helping ensure the welfare and humane treatment of the animals in the world’s zoos, aquariums and conservation centers.

We are proud to announce the following victories on behalf of remarkable and endangered animals:

- **Helping protect species in zoological settings worldwide:** American Humane now helps protect the welfare and humane treatment of nearly 400,000 animals at 63 leading zoological facilities around the world. Fewer than one percent of zoos and aquariums have earned our prestigious Humane Certified™ seal of approval.

- **Global expansion:** Major institutions around the world are lining up to become American Humane Certified and we now certify major zoological facilities in 18 U.S. states and 12 countries in North and Central America, the Caribbean, Europe and Asia.


- **Award-winning conservation materials for children:** Our “Humane Heroes” series of books and curricula encouraging K-12 students to value and preserve the disappearing species of the world won the 2020 “Teachers’ Choice Award for the Classroom.” Published by Chicken Soup for the Soul, elementary, middle and high school students read stories of animal rescue, rehabilitation and conservation being played out at American Humane Certified zoos and aquariums around the world.

- **Raised public awareness for humane conservation:** American Humane created a series of six educational videos about the vital role of zoos and aquariums in conservation, prompting more than 15 million views on social media. Our national television and radio public service messages with famed wildlife conservationist Jeff Corwin continue to promote support of humane conservation and have been broadcast nearly 50,000 times, reaching some half a billion people so far!

AUSTRALIAN WILDFIRES

For huge numbers of animals it must have seemed like – and for too many, it was – the end of the world. Some one billion animals are reported to have been killed in what can only be described as the apocalyptic wildfires in Australia. Remarkable, unique and endangered species have been dealt a devastating blow from which it may be difficult for some to recover. More than 40,000 square miles of the continent have been charred – 12,000 square miles more than were burned in the Amazon and 100 times the area incinerated during the worst wildfires in U.S. history last year in California. American Humane, which has been part of virtually every major animal relief operation since World War I, is working with our humane conservation partners to support lifesaving efforts to get veterinary care, food, water, medicines and supplies to the animal victims.

Two of our most recent efforts for this disaster include our work to support our American Humane Certified™ **San Antonio Zoo** in sending help to rescue and rehabilitate surviving wildlife. Additionally, we are

supporting the ZAA Australia Wildlife Conservation Fund which places rescued animals in appropriate facilities for care and addresses long-term recovery efforts to return healthy animals to regenerated habitats to revive and sustain populations of wildlife.

“The Australian wildfires have inflicted one of the most terrible losses of animal life of all time and we need our leading zoological institutions more than ever to step in with their expertise and help the survivors,” said American Humane President and CEO Dr. Robin Ganzert. “The experts at leading zoos and aquariums around the world are uniquely positioned to help the injured and orphaned animals affected by this devastating tragedy.”

During this past year, we worked successfully once again to put the spotlight on...

- **Keeping animals safe:** This past year, American Humane protected nearly 100,000 animal actors during more than 3,500 production days in the United States and around the world – a 16 percent increase!
- **1,000 productions – and seven Oscars!** We monitor everything from small indie films to the biggest box-office blockbusters.
