Your support made it possible for our team to offer vital wellness clinics, provide essential veterinary care, and deliver emergency supplies to families who had lost everything.

Our mission extended beyond disaster relief. We were honored to reunite retired Military Working Dog Frenky with his devoted handler, U.S. Army Ssg. Kristin in February. After years of dedicated service—including combat tours in Iraq and Afghanistan—Frenky is finally home, enjoying the retirement he so deserves, with lifelong veterinary care provided by American Humane Society. Stories like Frenky's are a testament to the unbreakable bond between heroes—both two- and four-legged.

And in a moment of celebration for humane filmmaking, I am thrilled to share that our No Animals Were Harmed™ program certified *Wicked*, *Nickel Boys*, *Nosferatu* and *Gladiator 2*, the Oscar-nominated films that captured the attention of audiences worldwide. This achievement spotlights our unwavering commitment to animal actors, working to ensure they are treated with the care and compassion they deserve.

Devastating LA Wildfires

American Humane Society Answers the Call

When wildfires brought destruction to Los Angeles and nearby counties, American Humane Society's rescue team was ready to mobilize. Shortly after a state of emergency was declared, our team worked alongside local organizations and municipalities to assess the needs of animals caught in the crisis.

With an 85 year history in Los Angeles through our No Animals Were Harmed™ program, American Humane Society was ready to spring into action thanks to support from PetSmart Charities. In addition to our Rescue Team that travelled swiftly to Los Angeles, we immediately redirected our LA office staff to humanitarian relief efforts; it was an all-hands-on-deck mission to provide immediate support and relief to the community.

One American Humane Society team member, Padma, went above and beyond and stepped in to help horses that needed to be evacuated. Horses need special care and attention, and Padma bravely and swiftly jumped into action to help at evacuation centers that took in horses displaced by the fires. Showing the dedication that so many of our staff consistently display, Padma helped to ensure the horses were being cared for by helping to feed and walk them.

Activating Our Rescue Field Teams

Our Rescue Team navigated the remains of devastated homes and communities, searching for lost pets, and leaving food and water for those too frightened to emerge from the wreckage. Alongside LA County Wildland Animal Search and Rescue, we provided frequent welfare checks for pet owners desperate for news about their furry family members that had to shelter in place during mandatory evacuations.

In shelter in place cases where the animal's environment is safe, but their family wasn't able to safely return, our team checks in with the animals to help ensure they received daily attention, including feeding, walking, cleaning, and enrichment activities so they can remain safely in their familiar surroundings until their family can return home.

We provided these check-ins for approximately 50 pets affected by the LA Wildfires and provided much needed stability for pets during an incredibly chaotic and challenging time.

Flying Adoptable Pets Out of Harm's Way

Our team mobilized alongside Wings of Rescue and Paws For Life K9 Rescue for two large-scale transport missions that airlifted more than 340 long-term shelter animals to shelters outside of California. With countless displaced animals separated from their families, moving these animals to other shelters made room for animals recently displaced by the disaster, increasing the likelihood of reunification for those pets still waiting to be found.

Our Rescue Team's dedication and love for animals was the heartbeat behind these coordinated efforts, making it a quick and flawless process. Support from PEDIGREE Foundation helped our Rescue Team activate for this transport mission and ensured these animals, who had been through so much, could safely arrive at their next stop before their forever home.



Pet Wellness Clinics and Shelter Visits

Recognizing the urgent need for veterinary care in fire-affected areas, our team also hosted a free wellness clinic. Volunteer veterinarians provided health assessments and vaccinations, while our team distributed vital pet resources to families who lost everything in the fires.

The clinic's mission was simple but profound: to ensure the well-being of pets impacted by the wildfires. Licensed veterinarians through Destination Pet, Ethos Veterinary Health, and National Veterinary Associates provided essential wellness checks and administered free vaccinations and flea/tick/heartworm prevention to the animals who needed it, thanks to a generous donation of supplies from Zoetis.

This Pet Wellness Clinic wasn't just about medical care; it was about community and comfort. Attendees left with not only healthier pets but also with replenished pet essentials like water bowls and leashes. Additionally, Brutus Bone Broth and The

Honest Kitchen donated food and treats for pets visiting the clinic.

We also worked alongside the Red Cross to address the needs of animals impacted by the fires. Our Rescue Team deployed at several Red Cross shelters to ensure the pets there had what they needed. We provided welfare checks, including making sure that animals had access to clean water, appropriate litter, proper shelter etc. We also offered up essential supplies, walked dogs, cleaned crates, and checked that animals were comfortable and well-cared-for during this challenging time.

Our commitment to these animals didn't end there. We also collaborated with local hotels that waived pet fees to accommodate evacuees and their beloved companions. As the fires forced families and their beloved pets out of their homes, we visited nearly a dozen hotels, delivering pet food and essential supplies for displaced animals and their families.

Preparing Pets in Case of Natural Disasters



When disaster strikes, it is crucial that you and your family stay safe – and that includes your pets. By having a plan and practicing it, you can be prepared to act at a moment's notice should a natural disaster come your way.

Here are steps you can take ahead of time to help prepare for a natural disaster:

- Microchip pets or put a tag on their collar with your name, address and cell phone number so they may be returned quickly in case you are separated from your pets. Be sure that any microchip information is up to date.
- Tie down or anchor outside objects that might fly about and injure someone.
- Know a safe place where your pets can go if you need to evacuate or seek shelter. Evacuation destinations may include a friend or family member's home, going to a pet-friendly hotel, or temporarily housing your pet(s) at a boarding facility.
- Evacuate your family and pets as early as you can and remember to take your disaster preparedness kit for your pets (i.e. First Aid kit, leashes, and pets' carriers, bowls, sanitation materials, chew toy, minimum 3 days, ideally 7-10 days of food, your veterinarian's contact information, and a photo of your pet).
- Have a plan already established on which family member is responsible for your pet's needs (who will grab the pet, the food, medications, water, disaster preparedness kit, carrier, etc.).
- Have a carrier ready that is large enough for pets to turn around and lie down comfortably.
- If your family must evacuate, take your pets with you.

American Humane Society's 14th Annual Hero Dog Awards® Gala took place in January at The Breakers Palm Beach! Known as the "Oscars® for Canines," the star-studded event was hosted by supermodel, actress, and entrepreneur Christie Brinkley and TV personality Carson Kressley.

The glitzy gala recognized America's standout dogs in five categories: therapy dog, service and guide/hearing dog, military dog, law enforcement and first responder dogs, and emerging hero/shelter dog. Americans nominate hundreds of furry friends each year, often ordinary dogs who do extraordinary things, and the public votes for their favorite hero dog!

This year's finalists included therapy dog Dayo, service hearing/guide dog Sampson, military K9 Niki, law enforcement and first responder dog Bo, and emerging hero/shelter dog Penny. These five heroic canines received celebrity treatment at the Hero Dog Awards® as they pranced on the red carpet, took the stage to accept their awards,

received raucous applause, and the audience shed tears as touching videos played throughout the night that told the story of what makes each of these dogs a hero.

The prestigious "Top Dog" title was bestowed upon the adorable young Bloodhound, Bo, a law enforcement dog who has made remarkable achievements in a short time with the Gastonia Police Department in North Carolina. Bo quickly proved his invaluable skills on two separate occasions by locating an elderly dementia patient and an 11-year-old autistic child who had gone missing.

Bo's most touching moment came in May 2024 when he found a 7-year-old child who had been taken at knifepoint. Bo tracked the boy for three and a half hours, through city streets, crowded gas stations, restaurants, and backyards. Thanks to Bo, he was found and brought home safely. Bo's incredible work continues to bring joy and hope, making him a true hero that inspires us all.

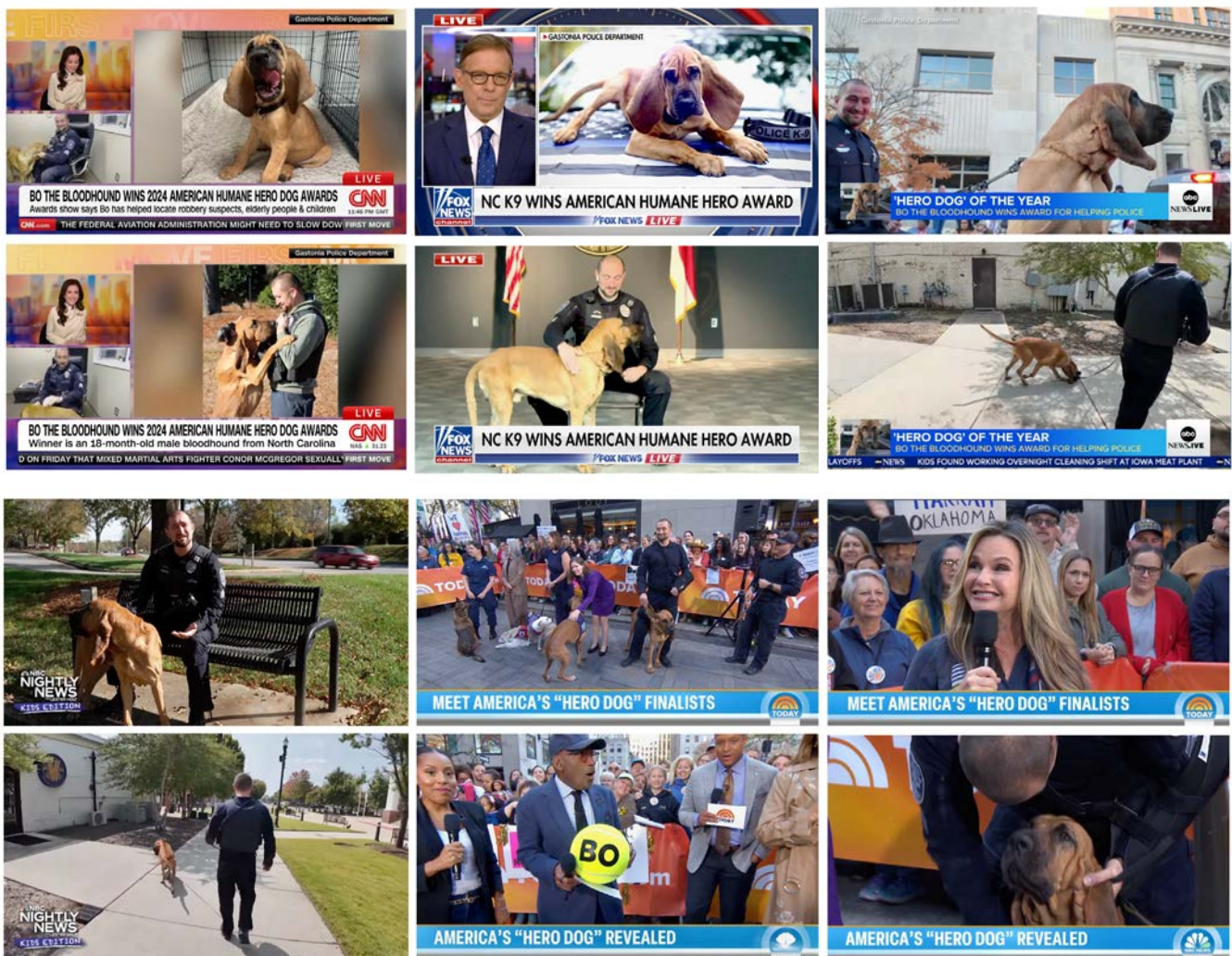

Global Humane Conservation Fund of Africa Saves Two Endangered Cape Mountain Zebras and Welcomes a Healthy Foal

Our Global Humane Conservation Fund of Africa (GH-CFA) program is deeply committed to protecting endangered species and preserving the delicate balance of our natural world. One such species is the Cape Mountain Zebra—an animal found nowhere else on Earth but in the stunning landscapes of South Africa. Not long ago, these remarkable zebras were at risk of extinction, with fewer than 100 left in the wild. Thanks to decades of dedicated conservation efforts, their population has grown to over 7,000. However, their survival remains fragile, and each individual animal is vital to their species' existence.

Recently, our GH-CFA team reported a distressing case—a female Cape Mountain Zebra suffering from abnormal hoof growth. Without intervention, she would soon be unable to walk, facing a slow and painful decline. Our team mobilized a specialized rescue team immediately and successfully treated not just one, but two female Cape Mountain Zebras. One of these precious Zebras happened to be

pregnant, and we are proud to share that with aid from our conservation experts, she has given birth to a healthy foal.

This incredible story reminds us of the power of compassionate conservation. It is the difference between suffering and survival, between loss and new life. Through our ongoing efforts, we are expanding protected areas—not just for the animals we all know and love, but for endangered species like the Cape Mountain Zebra, ensuring they have the space and resources they need to thrive.

Thank you to our incredible partners, our dedicated conservationists, and to all of those who support our mission of rescuing, caring for and protecting Earth's most vulnerable creatures. Together, we are making a real difference.

American Humane Society Reunited Retired Military Working Dog, Frenky with His Handler, U.S. Army Ssg. Kristin

The pair served together in both Iraq and Afghanistan and Frenky will now get a well-deserved retirement with his best friend.

Frenky, a 10-year-old German Shepherd, and U.S. Army Ssg. Kristin served together for nearly four and a half years, including a nine-month combat tour in Afghanistan and a 10-month combat tour in Iraq. Frenky was trained in explosive detection and bite work, and Kristin is now one of two drill sergeants for the entire U.S. Army's military working dog program.

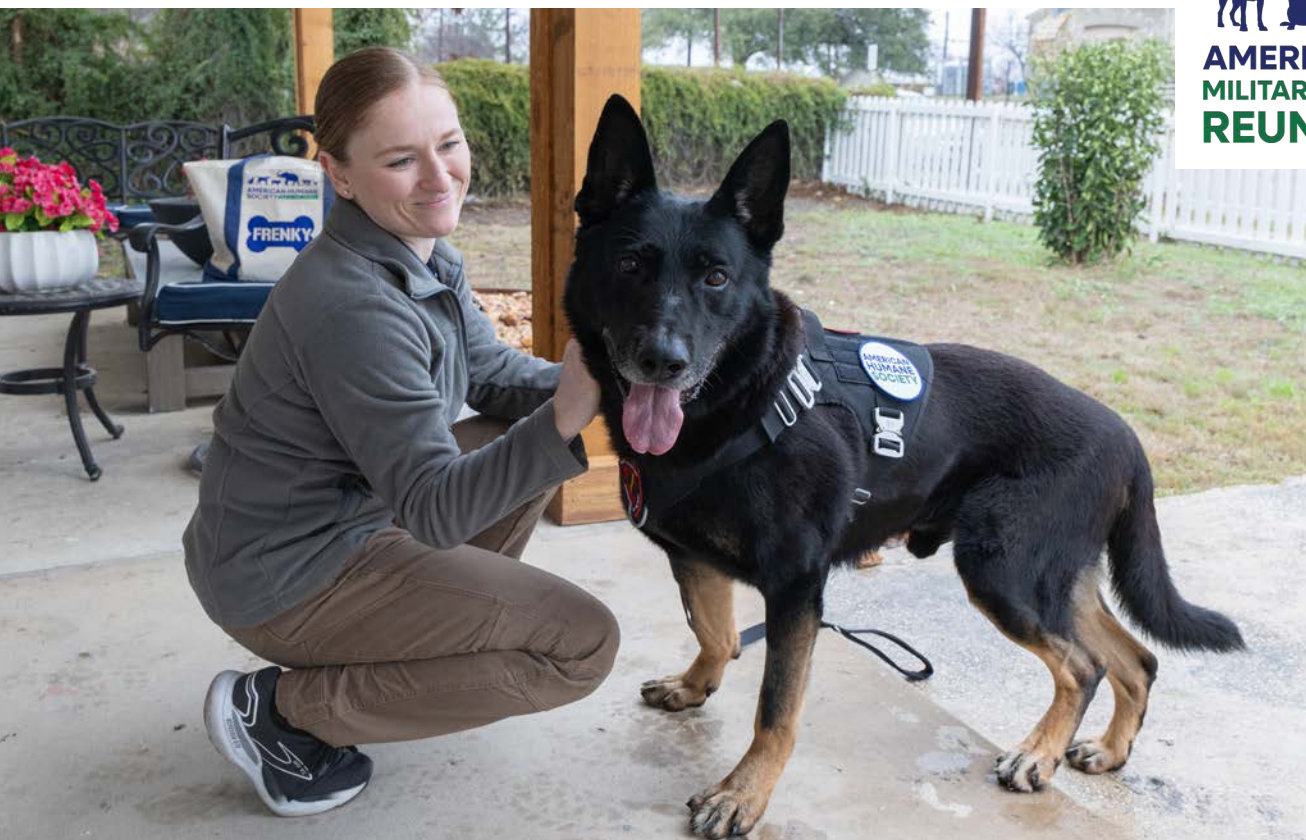
The pair completed roughly 20 Secret Service missions helping protect high-profile VIPs, including the U.S. president, vice president, first lady and several foreign dignitaries.

During their first mission with U.S. Special Forces, Frenky and Kristin encountered sniper fire and mortar rounds, tragically resulting in several American casualties. However, Frenky remained calm, and after the attack he quickly became an unofficial mascot for the base. His sweet, goofy personality helped boost morale and provided comfort during difficult deployments.

Frenky and Kristin were separated in 2021 when Kristin was reassigned to Fort Drum in northern New York. She was heartbroken to have to leave Frenky at Fort Johnson in Louisiana and said, "it was like leaving a child behind."

When the news became official that Frenky was ready for retirement, Kristin immediately reached out to us for help bringing him home. Our team helped reunite the pair by picking up Frenky from Fort Johnson in Louisiana and taking him on a road trip to his new home in San Antonio, Texas.

In addition to covering all transportation costs of the reunification, we will provide free veterinary care for the rest of Frenky's life. Kristin is excited to give Frenky the opportunity to enjoy being a dog, relaxing on the couch, and living in a safe home.





A Hero's Homecoming: Military Working Dog Angel Reunites with Her First Handler

For a decade, an adorable black labrador retriever named Angel was a dedicated and fearless Military Working Dog, serving both the U.S. Marine Corps and the U.S. Air Force with unwavering loyalty. Now, as she enters retirement, a long-awaited reunion is finally taking place. We helped bring Angel home.

Since 1916, American Humane Society has been dedicated to supporting our nation's veterans and the military animals who serve alongside them. We reunite retired Military Working Dogs with their former handlers at no cost to the handler and cover their veterinary care for life.

Angel's journey began in 2017 when she joined the Department of Defense's Military Working Dog program. Trained as an off-leash explosive detection dog, her keen nose and steadfast spirit played a vital role in ensuring the safety of those around her. From Japan to Korea, she served with diligence, always ready to take on the next mission. Throughout her career, she had multiple handlers, but none were quite like her first, Sergeant Justin.

Justin, who served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 2015 to 2021 and now continues his service in the U.S. Army as a Military Working Dog Handler,

was Angel's very first handler. Their bond was forged through challenges and triumphs, learning and growing together. "I was not the best handler off the bat, and she wasn't the best off-leash dog," Justin recalls. "We had a lot of growing pains together in the Marine Corps. She was extremely hard-headed, but she's the dog that taught me patience. She became my day one girl." Life in the military is demanding, and for Justin, Angel became a source of stability and comfort.

Now, after years apart, Justin and Angel are reuniting in Texas, where she will experience the joys of a well-earned retirement. No more work, no more long days of training, just love, comfort, and the simple pleasures of being a dog. "Honestly, my favorite part of working with Angel was when I would just let her be a dog and run free to decompress," Justin shares. "She loved the water—she'd recognize training locations with lakes or oceans and would dart straight in. She just loved swimming around."

With Angel by his side again, Justin looks forward to making up for lost time with boundless pets and cuddles. "I just want to spoil her and give her all the things that normal dogs have."

American Humane Society Hosts a Pups4Patriots™ Veteran's Retreat at the Sanctuary

As part of an ongoing commitment to supporting veterans and their service dogs, we recently hosted three female military veterans and their pups, matched through our Pups4Patriots™ program, for a special retreat at our Sanctuary in sunny South Florida!

Our Pups4Patriots program provides specially trained service dogs, at no cost, to veterans and retired first responders struggling with the invisible wounds of war, including post-traumatic stress (PTS) and traumatic brain injury (TBI). These remarkable dogs offer vital support, helping their handlers navigate daily life with confidence and ease.

This retreat offered the veterans and their service dogs an opportunity to bond, train and experience the benefits of a supportive, healing environment. Over the course of a few days, the veterans and their working pups had opportunities to practice their skills while finding moments to unwind. The veterans brought their dogs to the beach to see the ocean, met with mental health providers, played and trained with their dogs at our beautiful Sanctuary, and even decorated matching cowboy hats for themselves and their dogs as a memento to bring home with them.

The Sanctuary's nearly 15 acres will serve as a humane home to dozens of animals in need and will help us amplify key initiatives, including Animal Rescue Disaster Training and Pups4Patriots Service Dogs programs. Future enhancements to the Sanctuary will include a multi-species barn and farm paddocks for rescue animals, including dogs, rabbits, cows, ducks, chickens, goats and more. The sanctuary will also feature a Veterinary Triage Center to provide first aid and critical care for

animals in need. The space is made possible by the Kazma Family Foundation and additional dedicated supporters.

This initiative underscores our dedication to providing lifesaving service dogs to veterans in need, helping heroes on both ends of the leash.

Alarming, there are currently 1,000,000 species that are threatened with extinction with the prediction that one half of all species will become extinct by 2050. With just 3% of the world's ecosystems intact, “Escape from Extinction: Rewilding” seeks to halt this devastating decline in natural diversity by highlighting a conservation approach that puts nature first—rewilding.

Rewilding is an innovative conservation strategy aimed at restoring and protecting natural ecosystems by allowing them to return to their wild state. This approach involves the reintroduction of native species, especially apex predators and keystone species, which helps restore ecological balance and biodiversity, ultimately strengthening local and global food systems, mitigating climate change, and providing socio-economic opportunities for communities.

By showcasing inspiring stories of successful rewilding projects around the world, the documentary aims to raise awareness among policymakers and the public about biodiversity loss and its implications for our planet's future.

American Humane Society Helps Consumers Understand Humane Labels on Products

In this interview, Kelsey Bruno-Bayliff, farm standards & science coordinator at American Humane Certified™ Farm Animals, explains why it's essential to help consumers navigate humane labels. Humane handling is a value-driven commitment that consumers want to understand and support. "It's up to us to meet them there," Bruno-Bayliff says.

The American Humane Certified Farm Animals program provides third-party, independent audits to help verify that care and handling of farm animals meets science-based welfare standards. More than 1 billion farm animals are protected under American Humane Certified Farm Animals program welfare standards.

What approach can help engage and inform consumers about the benefits of humane handling?

Most consumers care about how farm animals are treated, but many simply don't know what humane handling really means or why it matters. That's where the industry, animal welfare advocates, and certification bodies have a powerful opportunity: to engage the public through clear information, real stories, and accessible tools that make humane choices easier.

The first step is making the benefits of humane handling tangible. Humane practices don't just result in better lives for animals, they also lead to improved meat quality, safer food, and more sustainable farming systems. These are outcomes consumers already care about; the key is to show them how humane handling contributes to those goals.

Certification programs also play a critical role, but they're not all created equal. That's why it's essential to help consumers navigate humane labels. Clear explanations of what a certification guarantees, and what it doesn't, can empower better choices. Infographics, QR codes on packaging, and web tools can demystify the labels and make humane decisions more accessible in the aisle.

Perhaps most compelling of all is the power of storytelling with real farmers, animals and practices. When we share these stories through images, videos, and first-person narratives we make humane handling personal. We give consumers a window into the lives of animals and the people who care for them, allowing them to connect with the food on their plate in a more meaningful way.

Humane handling isn't just a checkbox, it's a value-driven commitment that consumers want to understand and support. It's up to us to meet them there.

What emerging regulatory guidance is impacting livestock industry humane handling efforts?

Several emerging factors are actively shaping humane handling efforts in the livestock industry. One of the most influential is state-level animal welfare legislation, such as California's Proposition 12 and Massachusetts' Question 3. These laws set specific requirements for how animals are raised, particularly regarding space and housing, which, in turn, influence broader management and training practices. For instance, Prop 12 mandates a transition from individual to group housing for breeding pigs. While this change supports improved welfare, it also requires producers to adopt new management systems, train staff accordingly, and adapt over time to ensure successful implementation. Though these laws are state-specific, their impact extends nationally, as producers who sell into these markets must comply. To support this transition, it's critical that such legislation is paired with accessible resources, farmer education, and ongoing technical assistance.

Additionally, labeling regulations are beginning to play a larger role in shaping humane livestock care. Terms like "free-range" and "pasture-raised" have historically lacked consistent definitions and oversight, leading to varied on-farm conditions. However, as regulatory agencies begin to strengthen enforcement and clarify definitions, producers will be expected to align practices more closely with consumer expectations and verified standards.

What consumer trends are powering growth in demand for meat products sourced from humanely raised animals?

One of the most significant consumer trends reshaping the meat industry is a heightened awareness and concern for animal welfare. Today's consumers are more informed, engaged, and value-driven than ever before. Social media, documentaries, and advocacy efforts have brought animal welfare to the forefront, prompting greater scrutiny of farming practices and growing demand for ethical sourcing.

Where humane labels were once considered a bonus, they are now an expectation for many shoppers. Consumers increasingly seek transparency, wanting to know where their food comes from, how animals were raised, and how to make more responsible choices. In this landscape, credible humane certifications play a vital role by helping consumers easily identify products that reflect their values and meet their expectations for humane care and handling.



New Global/American Humane Certified™ Zoos and Nature Centers Providing Excellent Standards of Animal Care

Our team remains hard at work certifying the welfare and humane treatment of animals in zoological facilities around the world. Our rigorous certification program provides visitors with a way to recognize the best zoos, aquariums and animal parks around the world.

To be recognized as a certified facility, these sites must first pass a rigorous independent assessment that reviews the wellbeing of animals and demonstrate overall excellence in animal care and welfare practices. The unique process is guided by the latest science and best practices and is informed by a Scientific Advisory Committee comprised of respected veterinarians and experts in the fields of animal welfare, animal science, zoology, and ethics with decades of experience.

The following facilities became certified this year:

- **Forest Preserves of Cook County in Illinois** is the largest and oldest forest preserve system of its kind in the United States. Their six nature centers house and protect important native species and teach tens of thousands of visitors each year about their essential role in local ecosystems.

- **Dublin Zoo in Dublin, Ireland** cares for more than 400 animals from across the globe, including endangered species such as the Asian elephant, Asian lion, Amur tiger, red panda, aye-aye, and western lowland gorilla. They also have a pioneering Centre for Species Survival, which directly contributes to conservation efforts in Ireland.

These certifications were also benchmark achievements for our conservation program, as the Forest Preserves of Cook County's six nature centers are the first nature centers to become American Humane Certified™. Additionally, Dublin Zoo is the first facility in Ireland to achieve the Global Humane Certified™ distinction.
